



Edited by Mary Reed, Carol Wayne & Nancy Dachler \$10.00 Paper 242 Pages



Nancy leaves her settled life for the treacherous journey west following her husband. Betsy is a Kalapuya Indian attempting to preserve the wisdom and ways of her people. The book is based on a true story and is a multi-year saga of the women's lives.








An Enduring Legacy, The Story of Basques in Idaho by John Bieter & Mark Bieter

The Bieter brothers chronicle three generations of Basque presence in Idaho from 1890 to the present. It is an engaging story that begins with a few solitary sheep herders and follows their evolution into the prominent ethnic community they are today. This is a companion book for a recent lecture at the Bowman Museum. It is a richly detailed book, well researched and written, and a valuable contribution to our understanding of the variegated human landscape in the American West.




### This Just In! Kellogg Switchboard and Supply Co. Telephone

On the south end of Powell Butte the Heston family's farm was on a party line with eleven other nearby family homes. Jerry, Mayme and their two sons, Jerry and Jimmy, used this very phone – made by Kellogg Switchboard and Supply Co. – in their home during the 1930s and the 1940s.

The young Jerry Heston remembers, "Our ring was three longs and three shorts. Fred and Neva McCaffery's ring was a long, a short and a long. Jack and Sara Shumway's ring was two shorts. One crank on the phone would be answered by the operator at the Redmond Telephone Company. All rings on the phone and conversation could be heard by all of the people on the line, so there was a lot of 'rubbering,' or listening in on others' conversations."

Kellogg Switchboard & Supply Company was a major manufacturer of telephone equipment. It was founded by electrical engineer, Milo G. Kellogg, in Chicago, Illinois. Along with Western Electric (The Bell system), Automatic Electric (General Telephone) and Stromberg-Carlson, Kellogg's company dominated the nation's source of telephone equipment until after WW II.

This telephone was donated by Jerry Heston on September 29, 2014, and made part of the Crook County Historical Society's collection







### Museum Received Donation of Bicycle Racks
