### **Recent Events**

Over the past few months, our community has come together to celebrate and learn about our rich local history through a series of successful events. Highlights include:

- Cowboy Poetry and Music Open Mic: We had a wonderful turnout for our inaugural Cowboy Poetry and Music Open Mic event. ## Fall Historical Tour of High Desert Saturday Oct. 19, 2024

Depending on fire conditions the fall tour is planned for Saturday Oct 19. The tour will be heading south of Highway 20 at Moffett Road. Stops will include Whitaker Holes, Desert Pines, Dickerson Well, Berger Rock mammoth rub, Sand Spring, Plot Butte, Derrick Cave, the largest juniper in Oregon and the final railroad camp site of Brooks Scanlon. It will be a long day. Roads will be rough in places. Not recommended for small passenger cars. The route will cover about 100 miles.

There are no restroom facilites along the route so it will be nature in its finest for rest stops. Steve Lent will be the tour guide and guide books will be available for purchase. We will meet at the Pioneer Cabin Museum in Pioneer Park at 8:00 a.m. Bring your own lunch and refreshments.



A van will be available on a first come first serve basis. Please call the museum 541-447-3715 to reserve a spot on the tour. The tour will be limited to 10 vehicles. We can take as many people that will fit into the vehicles.

If fire conditions are still extreme the tour may have to be cancelled.!!!



## Prineville Past and Present by Steve Lent






## John Mullan: The Tumultuous Life of a Western Road Builder




## Chuck Wagon Cooking by Lucy Hanley, ed.

## The Osborne Firefinder

Note: Ray Kersek is the author of Fire Lookouts of Oregon and Washington which documents the locations and history of fire lookouts in the northwest. The use of the firefinder is a crucial part of discovering fires once they start and has been an invaluable tool since it was developed.

William Bushnell "Bush" Osborne, Jr., as a young graduate forester, went to work for the U.S. Forest Service in 1909 on the Oregon National Forest at Mount Hood.

In 1911 he invented an alidade he called the "firefinder" and tested in at 8 locations in Oregon and SW Washington. The original instrument was 14" across, round, with a map of the surrounding area, and each of 360 degrees etched around the rim. This disc was secured to an 8-sided 1/8" steel base which was in turn secured firmly to a tree stump. A brass sighting mechanism consisting of a rear vertical slit and a front vertical horse hair stretched tight, pivoted precisely in the center of the circle. The location of the lookout point was situated exactly in the center of the circular map. An arrow etched beneath the rear sight corresponded with a radical change. Its width was enlarged from 14' to 24" the compass reading when the sights lined up on distant across. Its weight was increased from 10 to 70 pounds, smoke.

This first Osborne Firefinder was commercially produced in 1913 by Fred Leupold and Adam Volpel 1913-1914 models; however, the front sight is equipped (Leupold-Volpel & Co.) at their scientific instrument with a thin brass tape which could be moved up and manufacturing facility in Portland (Oregon). The U.S. Forest Service purchased fewer than 100 of these 1913 turned back and forth while the observer sighted through Model Osborne firefinders.

In 1914 the center-pivot sighting mechanism was abandoned in favor of a circular outer ring with the original fore and aft sights affixed to it. A cast iron base with a round recessed rim permitted the sights to be moved freely around the rim. Zero degrees was positioned true South from the lookout location. To prove this instrument, "Bush" Osborne placed it atop Mount Hood the following summer. In one month lookout Elijah "Lige" Coalman spotted and reported 131 fires with this instrument!

In 1915, Osborne again modified his "firefinder" sighting mechanism. The 1915 model featured a 0-power scope similar to those used on a rifle, instead of the original fore and aft upright sights, to peer through. Precision calibration permitted obtaining azimuth readings to 1/60th of 1 degree; and a vertical angle reading in 1/10th of 1 degree accuracy. Several hundred

of the 1915 Osborne Firefinders were produced by Leupold-Volpel Co.

In 1917, Bush Osborne again gave his Firefinder including the 3-railed track it sat upon. It featured rugged alidade sights front and back, using the concept of the down freely with a thumb wheel. As this wheel was

the rear sight slot at the distant topography, a pencil attached to a sliding gear-driven arm could draw the panoramic features of the horizon. Thus, a panoramic picture could be drawn to accompany "seen area" maps made by the firewatcher. About a hundred 1917 Osborne Firefinders were manufactured.

In 1934, Osborne again radically changed only the sighting assembly, to include a far more simple mechanism. The rear sight now included "+" (plus) and "-" (minus) vertical scales and two sets of cross threads of horse hair, so that accurate vertical readings could be made on fires both below and above the lookout's elevation. Leupold-Volpel Co. manufactured more than three thousand of the lighter weight 55 pound 1934 Osborne Firefinders, until it ceased to produce the instrument in 1989.

For a time prior to that, the A. Lietz Co. of San Francisco also manufactured the Osborne Firefinder in small quantities. The 1934 Osborne Firefinder is the most widely used fire plotting instrument in the world today. It is used across America, and in many foreign nations on at least four continents. They were last featured for sale in the 1991 Forestry Suppliers catalog for \$3,495 each.

As our summer slowly winds down, we are ramping up our exciting new exhibits here at the museum. Opening Monday September 9, the Belknap Exhibit Center will be hosting an exhibit from the Oregon Historical Society. We hope that this exhibit, titled "150 Million Years of Statehood" will immerse visitors in the breathtaking natural beauty and rich geological history of Oregon. This exhibit will feature some of the state's most iconic landscapes, including Crater Lake, Multnomah Falls, Newberry Crater, Steens Mountain, and the nearby Painted Hills. Among the highlights of the exhibit is a beautiful handmade relief map of the Prineville area, offering visitors a detailed view of the local geography, including the Crooked River Corridor.

One of the most intriguing aspects of the exhibit is the exploration of the Prineville Valley's ancient origins. Many may be surprised to learn that this serene valley was once the

site of a super volcano, whose caldera now lies hidden beneath the surface. This geological revelation adds a layer of depth to this region's history, illustrating how past volcanic activity has shaped the landscape we see today. For those interested in rockhounding, Crook County offers numerous sites where enthusiasts can discover a variety of unique and beautiful stones, each telling its own story of Oregon's dynamic geological past. We were so graciously temporarily donated a fellow historical society member's rockhounding collection to help illustrate some of the many treasures that can be found in Prineville's own backyard.

The Bowman Museum's new exhibit not only celebrates the natural beauty of Oregon but also serves as an educational resource, shedding light on the powerful geological processes that continue to influence the state. Visitors will have the opportunity to engage with the history and science behind these magnificent landscapes, gaining a deeper appreciation for the forces that have shaped Oregon into the place we know and love today. Be on the lookout for upcoming lectures that touch on some of these geological wonders!




