Joy Houston was born in January 1933 in Prineville. Her family has extensive roots in Crook County dating back to 1875. Her grandparents Charles and Sarah Gregory Houston settled near Bear Creek in southern Crook County.. Her parents were Waldo and Bessie Stuart Houston. Joy attended school in Prineville until age 17.

She married John Harvey in 1952. He had a career in the U.S. Navy and the family moved several times during the first 22 years of their marriage. They had two sons, Mike and Paul. They eventually moved back to Prineville in 1971. Joy has lived in Prineville since then. She was selected as Pioneer Queen and was announced at the Pioneer Queen Picnic in August of 2024.



The society has several projects in the planning stage for this year. One our projects is a multi-year initiative titled "Museum





Starting in March, the Bowman Museum is proud to host a new exhibit showcasing the rich history of Crook County Fire & Rescue and the vital work of the Prineville Fire Department over the past century. Established in 1884, Crook County Fire & Rescue is the oldest fire department in Central Oregon. As a "Special District" accountable to a five-member elected board, the department has grown alongside the community it serves. Today, it provides fire suppression, prevention, investigation, inspection, and emergency medical services to approximately 26,000 residents across a 450-square-mile area, including Prineville, Powell Butte, Juniper Canyon, and Lone Pine.


This exhibit comes at a special time as Crook County Fire & Rescue celebrates its over 140-year old legacy amidst

rapid growth and change in Central Oregon. With 50 emergency responders, including 21 career staff working across three shifts—the department responds to approximately 3,600 calls for service each year. The exhibit not only honors this crucial work but also highlights the department's deep-rooted history, dating back to its beginnings as the first fire service in the region.

We are especially excited to host this exhibit as Crook County Fire & Rescue wraps up renovations on their historic building. This partnership gives the community a unique opportunity to explore their impressive collection of rescue history.

Visitors can expect to see historic fire engines, vintage uniforms, and photographs of past fire crews. Additionally, antique fire engines will be on display every other weekend in March and April, offering a rare glimpse into the evolution of firefighting equipment.

We are honored to showcase this important chapter of our community's story in tandem with the fire department's open house on March 8. Mrs. Mollie Gibson Tells of Experiences of Pioneer Days

Move from Willamette Valley to the Post Country in 1886

I, Mary B. Cantrell, afterwards known as "Aunt: Mollie Gibson, was born in Sanoma County, California on November 24, 1861.

My mother died in 1863 and in 1866 my father decided to immigrate to Oregon. We left in a covered wagon and drawn by a team of horses to make the long trip to what is now Lane County.

There were four children, my brother and two sisters, and in company with one other family, we began our journey. I do not remember this trip, as I was only five years old. We arrived at my uncle's home, near Eugene, Oregon, after a few weeks of travel over a road that was little better than a trail.

I lived with my uncle until I was ten years old. Then my father married Suzan Ward and I made my home with them until I was 17 years old. I was married to John A. Gibson in 1879 and we lived on my father-in-law's donation land claim on the Long Tom River in Lane county.

There were no highways there at that time and it took all day to go to the nearest town, do a little trading and back home, a distance of, perhaps, of eight to ten miles. The greater part of the roads were corrugated and in the winter, should a wagon get off the corrugation, it was in mud to the hub of the wheels.

We lived there until October of 1886 when we decided to come to central Oregon. Loading a few household goods into a wagon box we started for Prineville over the McKenzie pass on the old wagon road over the lava beds.

It took us about a week to make the trip and one week after our arrival at Post, a daughter was born.





My husband cut green pine logs and put up a one-room cabin on a squatter's claim and while the logs were yet green, and in the middle of the winter, we moved into it. We could buy some things in Prineville at that time, but most of our supplies we freighted in by wagon from The Dalles.

I have had nine children, seven of them are still living. In 1912 my husband passed away and a few years later I took up a homestead. Twenty-one years ago I moved from Post to Prineville and have made this my home ever since.

One of my sisters, Missouri Driscoll, lives in Lewiston, Idaho and the other Suzan Gibson lives in Williams, California. My brother, William, died several years ago. My father fought in the Indian was that put the Piute Indians on the reservation. He fought in the battle of Battle Rock, in the Millican country.

Note: John Archibald Gibson passed away in 1912 and is buried in the Knox Cemetery near Post, Oregon. Mollie Gibson lived on for several years and passed away in 1940 and is buried in Juniper Haven Cemetery in Prineville.



Fireman's Christmas Ball Ad 1888





Items at Museum



on our historic courthouse which is among the more photographed buildings in Central Oregon.


Riverwater: A Natural and Social History of the McKenzie River
